Prospects for 2025 Salmon Season

After rises in levels at the beginning and end of January, the river was cold but falling as low as 1.24 at Redbrook until heavy rain over the final weekend of February has brought the river into quite a large spate which will ruin the lower river into the opening week at least.

Interestingly some kelts had been noted around the Hereford area over the past few weeks but they will now be gone with the flood water. When the spate finally falls there may be a few 3SW fish anywhere from Builth Wells to Monmouth ②. Spinning or Fly you might ask, depends on the height and clarity. The old favourite for Wye spring fish was a green and yellow devon 2.5 - 3 inches, they look odd now with a single hook but they will still work, maybe try a willie gun in various sizes or a wye thunder Geoff Franks pattern, all you need is a taking fish to present it to As pf today 2nd March the lower river is still out @ 1.85, but the river around Ross is clearing and coming into a reasonable condition. Good luck and tight lines.


Finally I hope that you have all tied your flies, the weather may have given you a few more days


Citizen Science

WSA Citizen Science volunteers sample the Wye and its watercourses on a regular basis, the graph summarizes

their work for February. As you can see, the phosphate levels in the Worm and the Gamber, both significant tributaries of the Wye are well above the target levels set by statutory bodies. These levels lead to excess algal growth that in turn prevents or slows the growth of the water crowfoot that the Wye used to be famous for. It is this evidence that informs the decisions of those bodies into taking action to revive the river.

We're always looking for more volunteers to collect samples, particularly on the Ithon, the Lynnfi and Felindre Brook All equipment and training will be provided along with a WhatsApp group to post queries and to keep in touch with other volunteers.
